QCHCA's involvement in Land Use development applications allows the community to influence the Municipality and outcomes. Over the past year, QCHCA was involved in proposals for 4 condo projects, 4 commercial developments, 3 townhouse projects, 2 social housing projects, and 8 subdivisions. We met development proponents, neighbours, Municipal Council, Engineers and Planners to provide community input to their decisions.

The Association hosted many community activities including Playfair Community Picnic, Music in the Park, hot dog fundraisers and Playfair and Cedar Hill Parks cleanup events. The 2nd annual QCHCA Christmas Party at the Cedar Hill Golf Course Clubhouse was a big success.

Graffiti Clean-up Event

You are likely familiar with the "broken window theory" which suggests that maintaining and monitoring urban environments helps prevent small crimes such as vandalism and graffiti, and creates an atmosphere of order and lawfulness. As a result, more serious crimes are discouraged. It is our experience that neglecting graffiti results in more graffiti and "tags" on telephone poles and other areas within our community.

Cleaning graffiti in our neighbourhoods shows that the community cares about aesthetics and safety. In 2014 the Saanich Police Bike Section and Saanich Public Works coordinated events with local residents to remove graffiti from telephone poles, private businesses and numerous other locations.

The Saanich Police Bike Section with the QCHCA President John Schmuck and member Brian Butterfield are planning a Spring Graffiti Clean-up event in the Quadra Cedar Hill neighbourhood.

WHEN: 11 am to 1pm on Saturday, May 9, 2015. We will meet at Playfair Park parking lot, 1198 Rock Street, Saanich. Please walk, cycle or carpool to the park to reduce parking issues.

We need volunteers to help paint over graffiti and to eliminate it from the Quadra Cedar Hill area. Graffiti locations will be identified in advance of the cleanup. If you want to rid our neighbourhoods of graffiti, please give us a hand. Please wear old clothes. Paint and brushes will be supplied.

Restoration of Playfair's Garry Oak Meadow

The deep-soil Garry Oak meadow in Playfair Park is a small remnant of one of the most endangered ecosystems in Canada. Despite major problems with invasive alien grasses and herbaceous weeds, the meadow is the best example of this ecosystem in Saanich and worthy of restoration. I live within 200 meters of the meadow and this restoration is my retirement project.

Over the late fall and early winter, regular park users will have seen selected areas of the meadow covered with either black plastic sheeting, cardboard or Garry oak leaves. These 'mulches' are temporary, left for only five to seven weeks to smother the non-native grass and weed seedlings that sprouted during the fall rains. The areas covered were selected because they have the highest native values and diversity (i.e. lots of Common or Great camas, White fawn lilies, Shooting stars, Western buttercup, etc.). Many hours of hand-pulling tufted perennial grasses were necessary before coverings could be laid down to tackle other invasive species.

At the beginning of March the meadow may look like grasses but it's not. There are native plants at work, emerging from winter dormancy, busy storing energy reserves so they can flower and set seed.

In March a couple of native species will be in bloom and others bloom into July and August. However the meadow will be in its glory at the end of April and early May. If you take a stroll along the meadow's paths at that time, it will be obvious where restoration work has started (Hint: Look for straight lines along treatment edges) and nothing has been done.

So far, I have done most of the restoration myself. Two other volunteers who also enjoy doing the picky work of weeding-by-hand have joined the team. Cook Street Construction Update

Cook Street reconstruction from Quadra Street to Maplewood Road is 5 months into construction and still on track for completion in May 2015, barring delays due to weather.

Key improvements include wider, concrete sidewalks on both sides of the street; new pedestrian crossings; consideration for future transit stops (if BC Transit decides to add routes here); protected, raised cycle tracks; fifty-six new trees and planted boulevards; four planted rain gardens; improved roadway lighting; planted median islands; and upgraded underground infrastructure (water main, storm drains and sanitary sewers).

Work first started at the north and south sections of the project to reduce disruption to businesses and Cloverdale Traditional School. To date, new underground infrastructure, curbs, sidewalks and raised cycle tracks have been installed in these sections.

The middle section of the project is now under construction with work on underground infrastructure, curbs, sidewalks and raised cycle tracks. The final stage will follow, involving asphalt paving, landscaping, line painting and traffic signage.

Project completion and road re-opening is still estimated to be May 2015, subject to clement weather. More information and future schedule updates can be found on the project website at:

Uptown's Phase Three Plans

How does QCHCA get involved in Saanich land use decisions? Here's just one example.

The QCHCA and other Saanich associations were invited to a presentation of Phase 3 plans for the "Gravel Pit" on the north end of the Uptown property.

Geoff Nagle, VP of Morguard Properties, said that construction of Uptown Phases 1 and 2, representing 73 percent of the project, are completed. Final Phase 3 has been split into 3A and 3B. Morguard will be asking for Council to approve a Development Permit Amendment for phase 3A so construction can be started on a 43,827 sq. ft. food store plus a 4,433 sq. ft. commercial retail unit. Uptown's plans originally contained a large residential component that has been reduced from 650 units to 83 units in an 18-story tower in Uptown Phase 3B.

As with every Land Use application, the QCHCA seeks input from neighbours as the basis for a letter to Council re the proposal and including a summary of community members' comments.
